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### Course Description:

**First Semester** - *Meeting Jesus in the Sacraments* (2<sup>nd</sup> edition; Ave Maria Press) is a study of Sacred Scripture. The course intends to help students recognize the living presence of God's Incarnate Son in the Seven Sacraments, especially in the Eucharist. Organized around three dimensions of the sacraments -- Understanding, Celebrating, and Grace.

**Second Semester** - *Your Life in Christ: Foundations in Catholic Morality* (2<sup>nd</sup> edition; Ave Maria Press) introduces students to a traditional understanding of morality, encouraging them to undergo a deep and regular examination of conscience while making daily decisions to live a moral life. Catholic morality draws on three sources of knowledge to help a person discern between right and wrong: 1) human reason (using our God-given intellects); 2) human experience (learning from the collective wisdom of others who have gone before us); and 3) Divine Revelation (learning from God whose truth can be found in the Bible and in the teaching of the Magisterium of the Church).

**Goals:** The student's overall success in this course will supply to him/her:

1. Preparation for future courses in Theology as well as any future ministries within the Catholic Church that the student commits themselves to
2. Practice in collaborating with fellow classmates
3. Familiarity with the current teachings of the Church established through sacred tradition and sacred Scripture
4. An understanding of the Catholic Church's role in regards to regional, and global issues.

- No extra credit will be given and the highest grade that a student can accomplish in this course is a 100 (see Antonian Student Handbook.) Students **may retake an exam** (excluding the midterm and/or final) **up to three times** (by appointment only) with the highest score being the one kept.

**Course Policies and Procedures:**

- **ELECTRONICS:** Cell phones, tablets, smartwatches, earphones, etc. – the use of such devices in class should be limited to course needs. Appropriate use is determined by Mr. Callahan alone. Students will be asked to put something away exactly once without repercussion.
- **FOOD:** The short answer is NO. Meal times are designated in your schedule. We work in close quarters and food is not only a distraction, but a mess, **and an invitation for insects and other unsavory critters.**
- **SEATING:** Alphabetical with exceptions and determined by Mr. Callahan with input from parents, administration, and faculty. It is easier to take roll, return work, and to count heads in an emergency.
- **COURSE MATERIALS:** Come prepared to class with a pen(s), pencil(s), paper, theology binder, and journal every day.
- Turn in homework on time. Work that is late is worth a maximum of 70%. Missing deadlines does not fall within the definition of excellent or above average work.
- When you arrive to class: get out your journal and a pen.
- **Only ask to leave the room in the case of an emergency.** If you do leave the classroom, sign out when you leave and sign in when you come back. Always take a hall pass with you. Do not visit in the hallway or take a “field trip” to another class. You only disturb the other class and I am not Netflix. You cannot pause and pick up where you were and expect to have complete understanding.
- If absent, make up any missed work, especially an exam as soon as possible (see student handbook).
- **Work from other classes** –If you are observed doing homework for another class in this course at any time, I will take it up. We will discuss the Apostles often. You can't rob Peter to pay Paul. \*wink\*
- **Lying, Cheating, or Stealing** – Students in this class do not lie, cheat, or steal nor tolerate those who do. Anyone caught doing so will go directly to the Dean/Principal and their counselor, coach, extracurricular advisor, Academic Integrity Council, and parent(s) will be notified immediately. Also, in the case of cheating, the student will receive an automatic zero. Work copied and/or plagiarized will **NOT** be accepted. (all essays/research papers will be turned in to Turnitin.com) Please use your best judgment and do your own work.

**Materials**

Students are expected to bring the following to class each and every day in addition to their text:

- 1 inch binder to organize class notes & assignments
- 5 section binder tabs
- Loose-leaf paper for notes **AND** a college-ruled composition book for journaling
- Blue pens for essays
- Highlighter, if desired (for notes and handouts)

**Spirituality:** One of the goals of Freshmen Theology is to provide every student with sound knowledge of the teachings of the Catholic Church in a way that promotes their spirituality. With this goal in mind, I think that it is important that each student spends time with God daily. Thus, at least once a month we will spend some time in the Chapel in silent prayer, adoration, and/or reciting the Rosary. We will also spend time in discussion on a variety of topics including the virtues and how with the knowledge we have gained through our study of the Church, we can better prepare us to become stewards of our faith.
